Call to Order

Chairman Church called the April 14, 2025, meeting to order.

Public Comment Period

Rex Brown was the first individual to come to the podium. Mr. Brown indicated that he was there to represent the Higgins family. Mr. Brown said he lost a grandson last July to brain cancer and was introduced to the Higgins family during that time. Mr. Brown said the County has compared the past owners of the Tri-County Speedway to the Higgins Family. He said the Higgins family ministered to him during the loss of his grandson, and they made financial contributions to his family. Mr. Brown continued by saying there is a lot of misinformation on social media. He said that the test and tune events are minimal in sound and time. Mr. Brown also indicated that he lives the same distance from the track as others who complain about the noise.

CR Davis was the next individual to come to the podium. Mr. Davis was in attendance to speak about Tri-County Speedway. Mr. Davis said since the new amendment, it's loud with the test and tune events. He said that it affects their lives, and it is difficult for his family to work from home with the noise that is emitted. Mr. Davis said 6 days a week for operations is not practical. He is worried about the value of his home and he said the noise affects their personal and professional lives. Mr. David also said that the noise can be heard at Baton Elementary and operations on weekdays will distract the children trying to learn. Mr. David concluded by saying maybe there could be compromise with sound barriers and noise modifications to the cars.

Lisa Wallace was the next individual to come to the podium. Ms. Wallace said she stood here 15 years ago asking for the Racetrack Ordinances to be upheld. Ms. Wallace said this has been going on for over 40 years, but it encourages her that they are good people. Ms. Wallace said there are times you can't hear each other talking because they are about 1.5 miles from turns 1 and 2. Ms. Wallace played a video of the noise from one car at the track on a Tuesday. She said she does not want to shut down a business. Ms. Wallace continued by

saying her dad bought this property years ago to get away from the noise from the main road. Ms. Wallace would like barriers and a compromise to be made.

Jackie McCool was the next individual to come to the podium. She said she purchased her home when the racetrack was dormant. She said she thinks the solution is for the sound barriers to be put into place. She said she is the one who sleeps in her basement due to the noise. She wants the Board not to extend the hours and said there needs to be a happy medium and the Board needs to take everyone into consideration.

Brenda McCurry was the next individual to come to the podium. Ms. McCurry said she lives on an extension from Hamby Street. She said when she moved there it was quiet and peaceful, and she has issues with sleeping because of the noise. Ms. McCurry does not think it's fair that people have to suffer through this noise. She said it's unbearable at night. Ms. McCurry asked the Board to take it into consideration how others are affected by the noise. She wants a change via barriers or the Board not to approve the new amendments to the Racetrack Ordinance.

Michael Rawls was the next individual to come to the podium. Mr. Rawls said he lives about 0.6 miles from the speedway, and he has lived there 20+ years. Mr. Rawls said the owners of Tri-County Speedway have done well with the community but badly with the noise. Mr. Rawls indicated that Hurricane Helene messed up the natural barrier by causing trees to blow over. Mr. Rawls said he does not support this new amendment. Mr. Rawls then stated that people who work a third shift will have to try to sleep through the noise during the day. Mr. Rawls said he has heard about the sound barrier, but it's not done. Ultimately, Mr. Rawls wants the sound barriers in, a noise pollution test conducted, and test and tune events to only occur during race weeks.

Stephanie Alexander was the next individual to come to the podium. Ms. Alexander said she has been doing research and there is a real problem all over the US with litter. Ms. Alexander said she would like to see Caldwell County be a poster child for less litter. She said there is numerous people coming into Caldwell County and there are new homes being built as well. Ms. Alexander stated this increase in population will cause more litter. She wants people to start thinking differently about litter and provided some solutions to litter. Ms. Alexander also wants large companies to get on board with reducing litter.

Daniel Duncan was the last individual to come to the podium. Mr. Duncan said he lives right across the road from the speedway. He said he is in favor of a sound barrier. Mr. Daniels said he was in an accident before caused by car haulers at the track. He also said that people have parked in his driveway and his family picks up a large amount of trash after events. Mr. Daniels said he has 5 kids that are home-schooled and extending the time of operations would hurt them during the week. Mr. Daniels said he is concerned about being able to sell his home with the noise and it's a problem for his kids to go out at night. Mr. Daniels wants the Board to be mindful of the expansion of more track time.

Invocation

Chairman Church called the meeting back to regular session at 6:31 PM.

Pastor Steve Parker of Miller Hill Baptist Church provided the invocation for those in attendance.

Pledge of Allegiance

Commissioner Starnes led the Pledge of Allegiance for those in attendance.

Agenda Amendments from the Board, Manager & Public

Interim County Manager Wayne Rash informed the Board of two small changes to the agenda. Item 6 had an updated resolution for the Board to consider and Item 18 would be removed from the agenda.

Vice Chairman LaBrose made the motion to adopt the agenda as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Agenda Items

1. Gift to Lim Family and UNC Health Caldwell

The Board presented April Lim, wife of Dr. Roger Lim, and Dr. David Lowry, CEO of UNC Health Caldwell, both with resolutions honoring the life of Dr. Roger Lim.

2. Economic Development Agreement with Vista Ventures Development, Inc.

Economic Development Director Ashley Bolick came to the podium to present. Mrs. Bolick provided an overview of Vista Ventures and its purpose. Mrs. Bolick then provided an outline of the general statute that allows this non-profit to operate in this capacity. Continuing, an overview of how other counties operate their Economic Development offices was presented to the Board. The agreement being presented to the Board would establish a formal agreement between Vista Ventures Development, Inc. and the County. Mrs. Bolick provided more information indicating that there are numerous companies that have been interested in coming to Caldwell County, but the County does not have the facilities that contain the specifications these companies are looking for.

Mrs. Bolick noted one amendment to the agreement. This amendment would be made to section 2.02 to strike the "0% or a rate" to make this sentence read: "The note shall bare an interest rate to be mutually agreed upon by the parties".

Commissioner Branch made the motion to approve the agreement with Vista Ventures as presented with the amendment by Mrs. Bolick.

Chairman Church said this is a joint venture between the County and Vista Ventures Development, Inc. to bring business into Caldwell County. He said the Board has seen other communities do this, and it has been prosperous for those communities.

Chairman Church continued by saying the government is restricted in what and how it can do things, but a non-profit is not as restricted.

The motion carried unanimously.

3. Child Abuse Prevention Month

Laura Harrison with DSS came to the podium to read the Resolution for Child Abuse Prevention Month for those in attendance.

Commissioner Potter made the motion to approve the proclamation as read.

Chairman Church thanked Ms. Harrison and DSS for their service to Caldwell County. The motion carried unanimously.

Tonia Macchia with the Guardian Ad Litem program came to present a proclamation declared by North Carolina Governor Josh Stein. The proclamation honored those

individuals working with the Guardian Ad Litem program. Mrs. Macchia read the proclamation for those in attendance.

Chairman Church made the motion to adopt the proclamation as read. Chairman Church then said he appreciates the Guardian Ad Litem program. The motion carried unanimously.

DSS Director Kim Arnett said a few words about the DSS office and noted their dedication to their jobs.

4. Caldwell & Pasquotank MOU for Alternate Routing

Communications Supervisor Becky Price came to the podium to present a MOU between Caldwell and Pasquotank Counties. The MOU would allow for Caldwell County 911 calls to be redirected to Pasquotank County in the event that Caldwell's Communications Center becomes overwhelmed. The MOU also allows for Caldwell to be the backup communications center in the event Pasquotank County has any issues. The 911 Board recommends counties having a 911 backup and prefers one county to be Eastern and one county to be Western.

Commissioner Starnes made the motion to adopt the MOU with Pasquotank County. The motion carried unanimously.

5. Telecommunicators Week

Telecommunications Supervisor Becky Price remained at the podium to present a proclamation in honor of Telecommunicators Week. Ms. Price said the telecommunications team is very good at what they do and continued by reading the proclamation for those in attendance.

Commissioner Potter made the motion to adopt the proclamation. Chairman Church said he appreciates all the Telecommunications staff. Commissioner Potter said telecommunicators are in the calm in the storm and thanked them for their service. The motion carried unanimously.

6. Conveyance of Surplus Property

Emergency Services Chief Trevor Key said two local fire departments have requested County-owned vehicles that are ready to be surplus. Those departments are Sawmills Fire and Rescue and Yadkin Valley Fire Department.

Vice Chairman LaBrose made the motion to convey the surplus property items to Sawmills and Yadkin Valley. The motion carried unanimously.

7. Lease Extension - Helene Recovery Space

Logistics Chief Jeff Cardwell came to the podium to request an extension of the lease of the warehouse being used by Emergency Services. Chief Cardwell said this space started out as the donation center after Hurricane Helene and has been useful in other areas such as vehicle and equipment storage. Chief Cardwell asked to extend the lease through August 2025 and the lease amount could be fully refunded by FEMA. Commissioner Potter asked how much the lease costs the County. The lease amount is \$25,000 a month and utilities are minimal. Chairman Church asked if there was an

opportunity to lease the space beyond August. Chief Cardwell noted that the County could continue leasing this space, but it takes away a manufacturing facility for Economic Development. The cost of the warehouse is \$2,500,000. Chief Cardwell told the Board if the County does build the joint communications center, they could cut the ancillary building and purchase this one. This option would be cost-saving for the County.

There was a brief discussion about the Cook Building's size, and its functionality.

Commissioner Starnes made the motion to extend the lease on the space being used for Hurricane Helene until August 31, 2025.

The motion carried unanimously.

8. Hurricane Helene Expenditures- \$3,000,000

CFO Tony Helton came to podium to discuss costs associated with debris removal and reimbursement possibilities. Logistics Chief Jeff Cardwell said he is not concerned about being reimbursed for the debris removal costs, the reimbursement is just a long process. Chief Cardwell encouraged the Board to reach out to local Congressional Representatives to encourage FEMA to relay funds to the County quicker. Chief Cardwell said the County has applied for expedited funding. There was discussion about the amount already allocated to support debris pick up and the remaining funding needed. CFO Helton said the County can pay the amount and would be okay right now. Commissioner Branch is concerned about the amount of funding with the upcoming budget.

Chairman Church made the motion to allocate the money in an effort to be able to continue debris removal and tasked Chief Cardwell and CFO Helton with recouping the funds.

The motion carried unanimously.

9. Amendment to Racetrack Ordinance- First Reading

Interim County Manager Wayne Rash reviewed the amendments to the Racetrack Ordinance for the Board.

Chairman Church said these ordinance revisions do not allow more races to be held throughout the week. Commissioner Potter asked if the amendments say the Speedway cannot race in February, it does not. Commissioner Potter said his goal as a County Commissioner is to find balance, compromise, and a happy medium. Commissioner Potter said the previous ordinance was very restrictive. He continued by saying that the Board has already extended the season by a couple of months to assist in finding a good balance. Commissioner Potter said he is open to more movement, but if we approve the ordinance the way it's written today, it loses the balance. He said the owners of the track have done a great job, but now it's created an issue. Commissioner Potter continued his comments and said the test and tunes were originally a method to bring in the funds to build the sound barrier. He said there was \$16,000 left out of the grant funding Tri-County Speedway received, and it was previously stated the Speedway would put this money towards the barriers. Commissioner Potter provided comments that he was told by one of the owners of Tri-County Speedway that the barrier was being installed for free, but to this date, the barriers have not been installed. He concluded his comments by saying he's willing to give a little more, but he's not willing to support the way it's written tonight. Vice Chairman LaBrose asked for clarification about the necessity of two readings of the ordinance. County Attorney Rohr

was able to provide an answer to this question. Vice Chairman LaBrose continued his comments by saying he has been on the Board through three ownerships of the Speedway. He said this owner has been a class act, but echoed Commissioner Potter's point that there must be a balance. The Vice Chairman said when a community and business get out of balance, that's where he has to assess his decision. He said he is willing to make some changes and wants to see the business thriving, but he cannot support the amendments the way they are written currently. Commissioner Branch asked Ronnie "Crate" Payne with Tri-County Speedway to come to the podium. Commissioner Branch asked when the barrier is going to be completed. Mr. Payne said they have had issues getting people to come and help with the installation of the barriers. Commissioner Potter said he is willing to do more, but he cannot do so until the barriers are put in place. Commissioner Potter then discussed how citizen concerns must be heard as well. The Board and Mr. Payne then discussed the noise level in the area. The discussion then shifted to the proposed amendments to the ordinance and how these amendments would alter operations at the Speedway.

Commissioner Branch made the motion to approve the Racetrack Ordinance with the amendment that, within 3 months, if the sound barriers are not put up, it will go back to the original ordinance.

Attorney Rohr said the Board could potentially do this, but there needs to be more language included because this would be a written ordinance. Attorney Rohr continued by saying he isn't sure what the language should be given that he is covering for Attorney Hall and does not have the proper background of the original ordinance. Commissioner Potter asked if the time in between the first and second reading could be extended to give time for installation of the sound barrier. Attorney Rohr said the board could vote on the ordinance at this meeting, and if it passes, the next reading could be set for the May meeting. If the barriers weren't in place by then, the Board could table the second reading to June, and so on.

Commissioner Branch made the motion to adopt the Racetrack Amendment.

Vice Chairman LaBrose said he appreciates the conversation, but for him, it is more than just the sound barrier, he is concerned about the days of operations.

Commissioner Potter echoed the concerns with approving the amendments.

The motion was carried by a vote of 3 in favor with 2 opposed. Those opposed were Vice Chairman LaBrose and Commissioner Potter.

10. Appointment of Planning Board Members

The applicants considered for appointment to the Planning Board were Travis Davenport, David Deal, John Moore, and Clay Wilson. The Board members all voted by sealed ballot.

The County Clerk tallied the votes and informed the Board that David Deal, John Moore, and Clay Wilson received the most votes for appointment.

Vice Chairman LaBrose made the motion to appoint these members to the Planning Board.

The motion carried unanimously.

Consent

Chairman Church turned the meeting to Interim County Manager Wayne Rash to review the Consent Agenda.

11. Health Department- Agreement Addendum

The Health Department received an agreement addendum in the amount of \$8,101. These funds will be used to implement state-mandated sanitation regulations.

12. Sheriff's Office-Weapon Sales and Purchase

The Sheriff's Office sold weapons in the amount of \$16,940.74. This revision allows them to use the funds to purchase new weapons.

13. Emergency Services- Acceptance of Emergency Preparedness Grant

The County received a grant in the amount of \$50,000. This budget revision allows for these funds to be spent.

14. Emergency Services- Close Out Ambulance Purchase

After completing the purchase of a new ambulance, an amount of \$1,131 was left over. This revision moves the remaining money back to the general fund and closes out the project.

15. Compensation for Board of Equalization and Review

A request was made to increase the Board of Equalization and Review Chairman's compensation to \$150 per meeting.

16. Adoption of Hazard Mitigation Plan

Emergency Services has submitted an updated Hazard Mitigation Plan for approval.

17. Approval of Audit Contract with Martin Starnes

The approval of the audit contract with Martin Starnes is requested.

18. Supporting Wilson Creek Designation of Delayed Harvest Area as Public Fishing Area

Item removed from agenda.

19. Ratify End Date for Burn Ban

The burn ban was rescinded on April 2nd at 0800 hours.

20. Veteran's Services- Approval to Submit Grant Application

The Veteran's Service Office requested to submit an application for a grant.

21. Approving Wayne Rash as WPRTA Appointee

The Western Piedmont Regional Transit Authority requested a resolution to be passed to document the appointment of Wayne Rash to the WPRTA. Mr. Rash was appointed by the Board at the March 10, 2025, Board of Commissioners meeting.

22. Approval to Advertise Emergency Services Positions

EMS has requested permission to advertise 4 vacant full-time positions (2-12 hr & 2-24 hr) and 8 vacant part-time positions.

23. Approval to Advertise Tax Position

The Tax Office has requested to advertise a vacant position.

24. Approval to Advertise Water Position

The Water Department has requested to advertise a vacant position.

25. Cajah's Mtn Interlocal Agreement - Plat Map

At the October 14, 2024, Board of Commissioners meeting, the Board entered into an interlocal agreement with the Town of Cajah's Mountain. Approval of the new property plat is requested.

26. Firework Application for Town of Sawmills

The Town of Sawmills has requested permission to have a fireworks display on May 10th.

27. Firework Application for Town of Granite Falls

The Town of Granite Falls has requested to have a fireworks display on May 2nd.

28. Reappointment of Candace Hagaman to CCC&TI Board of Trustees

Candace Hagaman has requested reappointment to the CCC&TI Board of Trustees.

29. Approval of Minutes from March 10, 2025, Meeting

The approval of the March 10, 2025, meeting minutes is requested.

Vice Chairman Labrose made the motion to approve the consent agenda as presented.

The motion carried unanimously.

Closed Session-Pursuant to § 143-318.11.a(6)

Chairman Church made the motion to enter into closed session to discuss matters relating to personnel as provided in N.C. G.S. 143-318.11 (a) (6).

The motion carried unanimously.

30. Removal of Communications Director Position

The Board returned to open session at 9:25 PM with Commissioner Starnes having exited the meeting due to illness.

Upon returning to open session, Chairman Church noted there was a recommendation to do a reduction in force of the current Communications Director position. With this, Communications will be moving back under the Sheriff's Office.

Chairman Church made the motion to do this reduction in force.

The motion carried unanimously.

Adjourn

With there being no more business to attend to, Vice Chairman LaBrose made the motion to adjourn at 9:28 PM.

WHEREAS, we recognize that children are vital to our county, state and nation's future success, prosperity and quality of life, as well as, being our most vulnerable assets;

WHEREAS, communities that provide parents with the social support, knowledge of parenting and child development and concrete resources they need to cope with stress and nurture their children ensure all children grow to their full potential;

WHEREAS, effective child abuse prevention strategies succeed because of partnerships created among citizens, human services agencies, schools, faith communities, health care providers, civic organizations, law enforcement agencies, and the business community;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Commissioners of Caldwell County does hereby proclaim April 2025 as Child Abuse Prevention Month, and calls upon all citizens, community agencies, faith groups, medical facilities, elected leaders and businesses to increase their participation in our efforts to support children and families, thereby preventing child abuse and strengthening the community in which we live.

A Proclamation

Whereas, the North Carolina Guardian ad Litem Program has a distinguished record of public service through the work of enhancing the quality of life for abused and neglected children petitioned in dependency court for more than 40 years; and

Whereas, all 100 counties in North Carolina have a Guardian ad Litem program; and

Whereas, all Guardian ad Litem programs recruit, screen, train, and supervise volunteer child advocates to speak for the best interest of the child served; and

Whereas, Guardian ad Litem volunteers come from a variety of professional, educational, and personal backgrounds and act as advocates for abused and neglected children involved in unfamiliar court and child welfare systems; and

Whereas, all Guardian ad Litem volunteer child advocates are paired with an attorney and supervised by the assigned local Guardian ad Litem program, and the district courts also appoint Guardian ad Litem volunteer child advocates to serve as officers, helping to improve the quality of information presented to the court by acting as the court's eyes and ears in the child's life; and

Whereas, every child deserves a voice in court, but not every child has a Guardian ad Litem volunteer, and abuse and neglect have long-term personal, economic, and social costs and have the real potential of hurting North Carolina's children today and in the future; and

Whereas, April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, an observance that reflects the purpose of Guardian ad Litem programs, which is to protect and defend children from harm and ensure that children who experience abuse and neglect are provided with the court-ordered services they need; and

Whereas, April is recognized annually in the United States as a time to honor the contributions of volunteers through National Volunteer Month; more than 3,000 Guardian ad Litem child advocates donated hours of service to children in 2024;

Now, Therefore, I, Josh Stein, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim April 2025, as "Guardian ad Litem Advocate Month" in North Carolina, and commend its observance to all citizens.

WHEREAS, the Caldwell County owns personal property in the form of an automobile

- a. 2015 Ford Expedition 1FMJV1GR2FEF09237
- b. 2016 Ford Expedition 1FMJU1JT4GEF27295

WHEREAS, these vehicles are currently in the Emergency Services fleet and are in excess of 150,000 miles on the odometer; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute §160A-279 authorizes a county to convey real or personal property by private sale to a nonprofit corporation if the city or county is authorized by law to appropriate money to the corporation; and

WHEREAS, Caldwell County agrees to convey these personal properties for the sum of \$1.00 to A) Sawmills Volunteer Fire Department, for the intended public use of this property in the service of all Caldwell County citizens; and

WHEREAS, Caldwell County agrees to convey these personal properties for the sum of \$1.00 to B) Yadkin Valley Volunteer Fire Department, for the intended public use of this property in the service of all Caldwell County citizens; and

WHEREAS, if these personal property items are to be sold or otherwise disposed of, all proceeds are remitted back to Caldwell County, or the vehicle may be returned and disposed of by the County.

APPOINTMENT OF WAYNE RASH TO WPRTA

WHEREAS, Caldwell County is a Member Jurisdiction of Western Piedmont Regional Transit Authority and therefore a representative of the County serves as a Member of the Governing Board of the Authority; and
